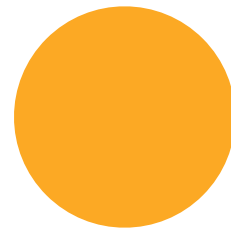
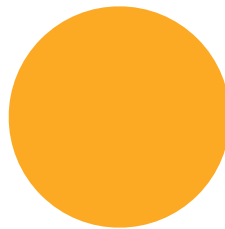
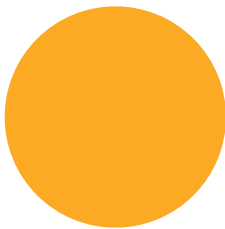
## Who We Are

### Mission and Purpose Statement

The San Ramon Valley Education Foundation is the primary fundraising organization working in partnership with the San Ramon Valley Unified School District (SRVUSD) to provide financial support and promote public education in our community.

The SRVEF has relationships with individual donors, local merchants, local service clubs and corporate sponsors and connects their interest in supporting public education with programs that impact children directly among each of the thirty five elementary, middle and high schools within the SRVUSD.

Together, combined with our 29 local school affiliate education and learning fund raising organizations, we collectively raise and donate at least \$7,000,000 each academic year.

## Financial Highlights

The Office of the Executive Director continues to be the hub around which the Board of Directors, volunteers and affiliates operate. Our Executive Director, Cristene Burr and her Project Manager, Celia Lee are the two point people not only running the business of the foundation but also the majority of the fundraising events and programs. Along with the help of our board and over 650 annual volunteers, our Run for Education and our Read-a-Thon have become signature events for the SRVEF and have nearly doubled in size in three short years.

Highlights include:

- Record Primo's participation and net revenue of \$250,000
- Record Endowment Annual Dinner income puts the Endowment Fund over \$1,000,000. SRVEF commences funding the Silicon Valley Math Initiative
- Teacher and School Grant program expanded to \$101,000
- Classroom of the Future Matching Grant program implemented with \$158,000 from SRVEF. 33 district schools participated. Nearly 2000 iPad or equivalent devices added to our schools.



## What We Do

### District Initiatives

#### *Classroom of the Future Matching Grant Program (\$158,000)*

This program came along at a perfect time to inspire wide support for adding much needed iPads and MacBooks to the classrooms of our District. SRVEF saw an opportunity to partner with our Affiliate Education and Learning Funds to invest in technology for students that would allow greater collaboration and access to key apps in courses that would enhance learning and engage students. This wildly successful program supported 34 projects totaling \$1,018,624. The program will add 1857 pieces of computer hardware to our classrooms and will impact 28,015 students. SRVEF is monitoring this infusion of technology very closely with the district technology and professional development team. We have developed an assessment tool for all grant recipients to complete in order to be eligible for future funding and we have scheduled many site visits to see this technology in action.



### *Coaches Council (\$10,000)*

The San Ramon Valley Education Foundation believes in providing educators with the very best professional development training available in all disciplines. We invest in a **Coaches Council** that is made up of the very best teacher mentors in the district from all grade levels. These teachers are mentors who provide training at all school sites. This training involves technology, classroom management, and curriculum. The techniques they learn are immediately applied to classroom instruction through a blended model of technology and content instruction. In 2012/13, they will design similar professional development opportunities for Science teachers, which goes along with both the **Common Core Standards'** concept of shared literacy as well as STEM.

### *Science Initiative (\$8,500)*

For the past 3 years, The San Ramon Valley Education Foundation has funded the K-12 Science Initiative that has increased science literacy for all students and increased the number of students who pursue careers in mathematics, science and engineering. Through the purchase of materials, funding for science fairs and field trips and professional development for our 23 science specialists in the district, we have made great progress toward these goals. In their inaugural year as participants in the Contra Costa County Science and Engineering Fair, students from the SRVUSD completed a remarkable sweep of the Grand Sweepstakes Awards in both the junior and senior divisions. SRVUSD students captured the top three awards in both divisions, qualifying them to participate in both the California State Science Fair and the Intel International Science and Engineering Fair. The six winners led an impressive overall showing by SRVUSD students that included 113 place winners and award recipients.

We are also working to establish an Imagineering Academy for 4-8<sup>th</sup> grade students that will take place after school to work with scientists, teachers and high school students on projects including but not limited to DNA fingerprinting, Alternative Energy, Sensors and Generators, Computer Simulations, Spectrometers and more. These workshops will be 3 week modules for 90 minutes/day with 15-20 students per session. By bringing the ratio down and giving students exposure to amazing mentors in science we hope to guide more of them to seek careers in mathematics, science and engineering. We are seeking corporate partners to champion this critical program for our children.

## School Grants

### *10 Grants Awarded (\$43,700)*

This past spring we awarded school grants as part of our **Educator Grant Awards program**. The goal was to encourage collaboration at a school site and to challenge schools to touch all of their students with this grant money. Funds were made available on July 1, 2012 and are not reflected on the chart below.

## Individual Educator Grant Program

*Over 40 Grants Awarded to Individual Educators (\$48,000)*

Grants were awarded to individual teachers who applied for classroom grants for everything from technology to classroom supplies to professional development. Grants were evaluated based on relevance, the number of students touched, and attention to 21st Century Learning in the classroom.

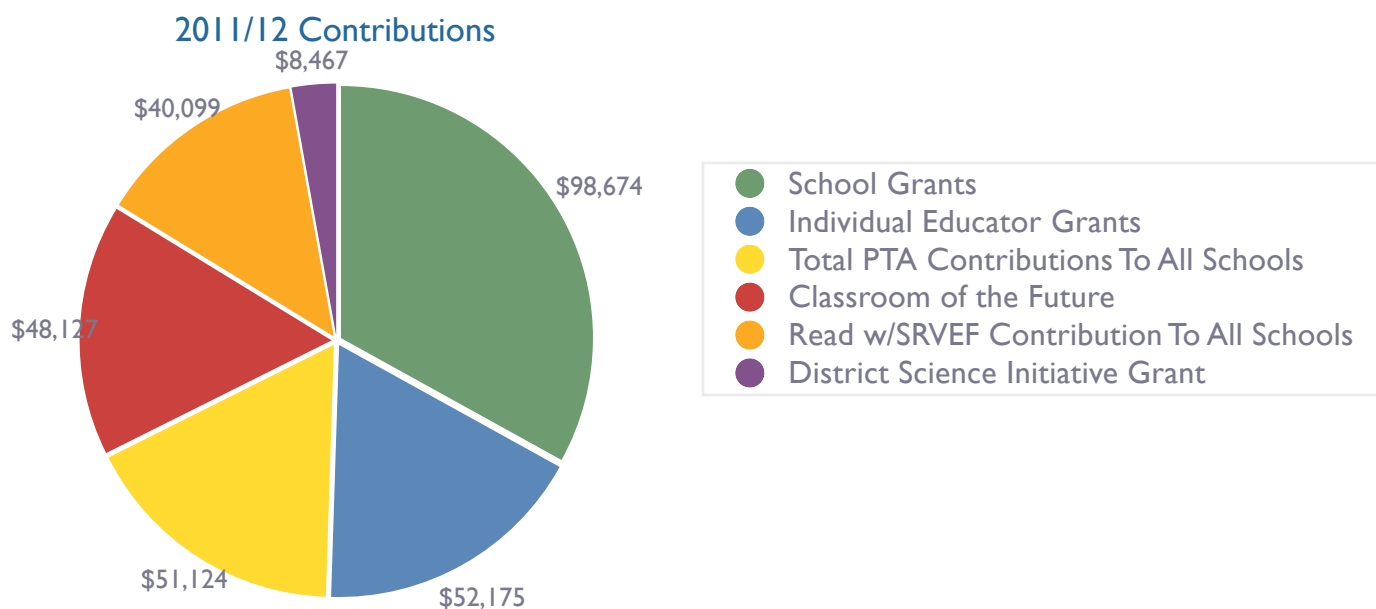


## The Annual Fund of the SRVEF

In the last three fiscal years our Annual Fund has donated \$170,000, \$258,000 and \$298,000 in 2009/2010, 2010/2011 and 2011/2012, respectively. In addition, SRVEF has pledged up to \$158,000 out of funds raised for our Classroom of the Future Initiative. These funds will be contributed in the 2012-13 academic year. This increase in our annual support is a direct result of our investment in professional fund-raising talent within our Executive Director's office and our clarification of the needs of the district into the four main causes mentioned above. We believe as we continue to educate the various constituencies about our mission and the increasing needs of the district, we will continue to raise and donate more each year.

Through our events we raise money to support four main causes: Classrooms of the Future; Science, Technology, Engineering & Math programs (STEM); Literacy and Professional Development.

Within our Annual Fund, we support both one time and project based needs district-wide in addition to offering teacher and school-wide grants each year. Within our Endowment Fund, we are building a permanent source of capital to support long term innovative educational programs.



## The Endowment Fund of the SRVEF

The vision of the Major Gifts and Endowment Program of the San Ramon Valley Education Foundation is to provide a stable, local funding source that will enable the San Ramon Valley Unified School District to undertake long term and innovative educational programs to enhance the curriculum. This past May, we celebrated the rich history and exciting possibilities of our Education Foundation and put our Endowment Fund on the doorstep of \$1 million at our 30th Anniversary Celebration of Night with the Stars. Our Endowment Fund will now provide sustained support for the **Silicon Valley Math Initiative**. This year we will partner with the SRVUSD and the **Silicon Valley Math Initiative (SVMI)** to train teacher/coaches at every school site who will in turn mentor and support teachers at their school. The training involves learning various strategies to improve instructional practice. In addition our teachers will be using the SVMI's Mathematics Assessment Program (MAP), which provides



rigorous problem solving and critical thinking assessments closely coordinated with California's newly adopted Common Core State Standards. This program has a successful 14 year track record of improving student achievement and understanding of higher level mathematics. It will ultimately affect every student in our district.

The **Endowment Fund** is designed to reach out to the larger community, especially those who may be interested in making gifts for long-term educational programs and curriculum innovation. It is designed to keep the principal portion of each donation intact, while using the dividends, interest and appreciation for curricular innovations. The Education Foundation works in conjunction with the East Bay Community Foundation to facilitate planned giving arrangements.

We can accept a wide range of assets including closely held stock, S corporation stock, limited partnerships and real estate. We also offer a variety of planned gifts, including charitable lead and remainder trusts. Future plans for the earnings of the Endowment Fund are to dedicate available funds towards Professional Development for long term, innovative educational programs. These programs will be designed and implemented by the highly professional and knowledgeable staff of the SRVUSD.

There are many ways to support the Major Gifts and Endowment Program:

- A cash contribution
- A contribution through a will or trust may help fulfill a number of estate planning objectives, including the reduction of federal estate tax liability.
- A gift of appreciated assets can result in income for the life of the donor and the gift of the remainder to the Endowment Fund upon the donor's death.
- A donation of an existing or new whole life policy can leverage a donor's contribution. Existing policies provide a tax deduction for their cash value. Premiums for new and existing policies are also tax deductible.

## Our Affiliates
